In high school, her math and science teachers were women and it was a bridge building competition in her physics class that inspired the first-generation Mexican-American to pursue an engineering career.

That self-assurance has served Brenda well, as she now successfully competes with much larger engineering firms to secure contracts with the Illinois Tollway.

The company Brenda launched in 2008 in Chicago's Humboldt Park neighborhood is

currently involved in bridge repair and retention wall projects on the Reagan Memorial Tollway (I-88) and bridge construction on the Elgin O'Hare Western Access Project. The firm recently added two engineers to its staff and is planning to hire two more to work on upcoming *Move Illinois* projects.

Brenda started her career with Teng & Associates Inc. and later worked as a consultant for Primera Engineering Ltd. She credits her former employers for helping her gain experience and to develop skills as a structural engineering consultant positioned to compete for heavy highway construction projects. She adds that they have both been highly supportive of her ambitions to hang her own shingle.
